RESTORING THE YILLAGE YOUTH INITIATIVE

#TEAMRTV!

The value of working together, finding available resources, facing consequences and asking for help were some of the key lessons learned by RTVYI youth and outreach workers during a field trip to Tigertail Lake Recreation Center in Broward County on Saturday, November 12, 2016. Funded by a public service grant from the City of Fort Pierce, the trip was part of a collaborative project between Fort Pierce, RTVYI, Department of Juvenile Justice, Sequel Care and the Children's Services Council to teach anger management, social skills, and moral reasoning to gang-involved youth through a 12 week curriculum, and to build trust among the youth, and with the outreach workers. At the Tigertail Recreation Center, talented facilitators engaged the youth in challenging team-building exercises, including daring climbs and balancing on ropes 35 feet in the air. Despite the difficulty of these activities, the youth showed resilience and learned how to work as a team to complete the tasks. None of the participants had ever done this before and they had a blast. Dinner at Golden Corral afterwards was a great end to a very successful day. Kids at Hope In Our Schools!

The Kids at Hope team is excited to assist Performance Based Preparatory Academy (PBPA) and St. Lucie Elementary in implementing the principles of Kids at Hope throughout the 2016-17 school year. Both schools participated in the Kids at Hope 10-10-10 Celebration, recognizing staff members who are "10s" because they never give up on kids. At PBPA, custodian Amie Rogers received the award. At SLE, chosen staff members included front desk staff, cafeteria workers, and teachers. PBPA also celebrated Kids at Hope during their Spirit Week, November 14-17, 2016. Spirit Week included a Friday Night Done Right Fun Day, reminding the teens that they can have fun without drugs and alcohol. At St. Lucie Elementary, the Kids at Hope team went to each class and asked students to identify good things about their teachers and created posters celebrating those treasures. The statements will be read during morning announcements so the entire school, and the teachers, can hear the results of "teacher-treasure hunting". SLE staff along with the Kids at Hope team have also focused on time traveling with the students. Each teacher created a destination board showing their lives in each of the four destinations (career, hobbies, community and family). Staff are also helping the students create their own destination boards.







The City of Fort Pierce Implements Kids at Hope

It is sometimes challenging for organizations that have been trained in Kids at Hope but do not work with youth regularly to find ways to implement the belief on a day to day basis. The City of Fort Pierce has taken the lead in doing this, agreeing to allow city employees to use work time to serve as Kids at Hope mentors at Performance Based Preparatory Academy and St. Lucie Elementary. PBPA is a school for students who have fallen behind academically and are now older than the usual age for their grade level. Facilitated by KAH staff, Fort Pierce employees are participating in group sessions with PBPA students every two weeks to engage them in thinking about how to prepare for their futures. At St. Lucie Elementary, Fort Pierce employees used the Kids at Hope book ("The Kids at Hope Friends Meet the Dream Stealing Villain") and puppets to inspire Kindergarteners and First Graders to work hard and never give up on their dreams. Thank you to the City of Fort Pierce for showing Fort Pierce children that all kids in Fort Pierce are capable of success, no exceptions!



This fall, Drug Free St. Lucie promoted the Friday Night Done Right (FNDR) Campaign at Homecoming events for almost all public high schools in St. Lucie County. FNDR is a social norming campaign to show teens that they can have fun without drugs and alcohol. We partnered with local high schools by providing a photo booth, materials, pledge cards and t-shirts for Homecoming. Participating schools included Performance Based Preparatory Academy, PACE Center for Girls, Port St. Lucie High School, Westwood High School, Treasure Coast High School and Centennial High School. We reached almost 1400 high school students with the campaign, and the students loved using the costume and photo booth to take fun pictures. The Roundtable Welcomes 29 High School Students to Youth Leadership St. Lucie

On November 15, the Roundtable re-launched Youth Leadership St. Lucie, an initiative to provide St. Lucie teens with development and leadership opportunities. The first meeting was held in the Fort Pierce City Hall Commission Chambers, and the teens were greeted by Fort Pierce Mayor Linda Hudson, Fort Pierce City Manager Nick Mimms, County Commissioner Kim Johnson, PSLPD Chief John Bolduc, and Lauren Fowler, a former Youth Leadership participant who provided students a moving account of her youth leadership experience. The students represented 5 out of 6 public high schools in St. Lucie County, as well as PACE, Mosaic, Golden Rule Academy and Acceleration Academy.

During the year, Youth Leadership St. Lucie students will participate in Youth In Action projects to reduce bullying, gangs, and drug abuse, advocate on issues that affect teens in front of local commissions and school board, and learn foundational leadership skills through the Building Everyday Leadership curriculum. They will also host a leadership summit facilitated by trainers from CADCA's National Youth Leadership Institute in February 2017.

Healthy Kids of St. Lucie County Donates Computers to the Roundtable



When Healthy Kids of St. Lucie County was first incorporated, the agency was the only entity in the community actively seeking out populations of children who could be insured through the program. Since then, the landscape for providing health care coverage, not just for children in our community but adults as well, has evolved. After meeting with Children's Services Council staff, the Healthy Kids Board voted to dissolve Healthy Kids of St. Lucie County and transfer all assets to other worthy organizations. The Board voted unanimously to transfer a laptop, iPad and other computer equipment purchased through non-CSC funding, to the Roundtable of St. Lucie County. This action was done with the hope that it might, in some small way, support the Roundtable's work to improve the health of children in the community through the work of their networks, initiatives and leadership.
