Lincoln Park Advisory Committee

On November 21st, the Lincoln Park Advisory Committee held its monthly meeting. The guest speakers were Lydia Martin, Chief Communication Officer and Heather Clark, Director of Student Services, from St. Lucie County Public Schools. They presented the District's Attendance Awareness Campaign. Their goal is to have a minimum of 97% of all students in attendance daily. Ms. Martin and Ms. Clark shared the importance of daily attendance and how it affects the community. Additionally, they identified the common barriers to absenteeism: health related issues, mental health, transportation, disengagement, family related issues, homelessness, and school climate.

LPAC members shared some to their concerns about specific incidents that pertain to absenteeism and children's safety. They asked questions of the presenters and it was established that further discussion is needed on this topic. Teresa Bishop, Executive Director Roundtable St Lucie, stated that LPAC will work with the District to review data specific to the schools that serve the Lincoln Park area and identify ways to support the campaign.

The Lincoln Park Advisory Committee has a standing invitation to other agencies and organizations to join and partner with LPAC who have a vested interest in the betterment of the Lincoln Park Community and its citizens. Listening to Our Youth

D.E., age 20 and once a disconnected youth, has made some important decisions. He's working now and has made the decision to go back to school. Most importantly, D.E. knows the kind of father he wants to be, one that's there for his little girl.

LISTEN HEAR UNDERSTAND

These decisions have been coming for a while in spite of a number of obstacles. Some of these obstacles were triggered by life circumstances; others by choices that were made; and others partially the result of an incomplete understanding of available options. As you listen to D.E., you also realize that some obstacles probably evolved through a combination of factors - all contributing to the "tyranny of the moment."

Through D.E.'s journey there were people who wanted to help. He can name them. He shares that these people came to work early, stayed late and came to his home to offer support. D.E. believes that reaching out is important. One of these caring individuals is Jarius Gilliam, Director at the Boys & Girls Club Fort Pierce Teen Center at Percy Peak. Mr. Gilliam connected D.E. to Kaila Moses, Career Coach at Eckerd Connects, and Eleanor Eberhart-Chin, Garden City Manager at CareerSource Research Coast, which is how we met him. Connections not only matter, they can make all the difference.



D.E. also stressed that it's important that youth "find what fits them." For him right now it's drawing, photography, and auto mechanics. He wouldn't know this if he didn't get to have these experiences, finding those positive things that he is passionate about and can build around. He is already thinking like an entrepreneur and designing tattoos that friends can take to licensed tattoo professionals. His "always learning" mode has caused him to ask questions, seek opportunities for developing these passions, while maintaining his employment and helping his family.

Yes, D.E. has made some important decisions that can change the trajectory of his life. The first step in doing anything is deciding to do it. He has taken that step. He has goals and is moving forward in achieving them.

The goal of the Economic Sufficiency Network is to listen to youth like D.E. Our challenge then is to use what we learn to develop a plan that will include supports for youth trying to reconnect.

This includes Childcare Resources and Referrals for all families, free Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten (up to 540 hours) for all 4-year-olds, and School Readiness Subsidized Childcare for children birth to age 13.

By giving young children the opportunity to experience a quality early learning environment, we set the state for them to become ready for, and ultimately, successful in school.









Club Kids Seek to Make Christmas Bright for Foster Children

Like most children, Brianna, 9, and Terah, 10, want toys. They don't want some toys. They want hundreds of toys. Brianna and Terah don't ever want to play with these toys Brianna and Terah are looking to make Christmas better for kids less fortunate than themselves.

Following the threats of Hurricane Dorian and seeing the devastation in the Bahamas the Club kids of Boys & Girls Clubs of St. Lucie County at Bayshore Elementary School were introduced to philanthropy by collecting supplies for the Bahamas Relief project.

Brianna and Terah weren't done. After seeing the success of the collection of necessities for the Bahamas they wanted to direct their momentum of giving to foster children in the community by starting a holiday toy drive called 'Jolly Toy Love'.

"We had some foster kids in our Club last year and we were good friends. Their Christmas stories were much different than ours. That's why we wanted to start collecting toys", said Brianna.

Communities Connected for Kids is the umbrella organization that will find homes within the foster services in St. Lucie County for all that is collected in the Clubs through their 'Making Christmas Bright' program. "We love that this was the brainchild of two Club kids which grew from their own personal relationships as members of Boys & Girls Clubs," said Christina Kaiser, Director of Community Relations at Communities Connected for Kids, the non-profit organization that oversees child-welfare services in Okeechobee and the Treasure Coast.

The young entrepreneurs of 'Jolly Toy Love' knew that if they could collect toys at all the twenty of the Clubs in St. Lucie County, instead of just their club at Bayshore Elementary School, they would be able to collect for more kids to make their Christmas bright.

"This is where the ideas start. It makes me proud that our kids are looking to do for others at such a young age. This is the seed that will make them great thirty-somethings one day and great Club Alumni," said Will Armstead, CEO of Boys & Girls Clubs of St. Lucie County.

In continuing the vision of community outreach, the City of Fort Pierce continues to go over and beyond to connect with our youth. We are happy to announce that we are concluding the second season of our football and cheer program. The primary focus of this program is to develop self-discipline, self-confidence, physical fitness, good citizenship, and sound character for our youth in this community.

We also aim to fuse the youth of our community with community members that can have a positive impact on their lives through sportsmanship, fair play, and fellowship. This impact promotes accountability and the likelihood that our children are excelling both on and off the field. We place a great emphasis on academics. This year we chose to join the Pop Warner Little Scholars program. Pop Warner was founded in 1929 and continues to grow and serves as the only youth football, cheerleading and dance organization that requires its participants to maintain academic standards in order to participate. As the only national youth sports organization that requires scholastic aptitude to participate, Pop Warner's commitment to develop America's young people on the field and off aligns with the City's vision for our student athletes. If an athlete falls under the required GPA, they are not eligible to participate in the program until they can show progress. Some coaches have even implemented study hall nights for children who may need assistance with homework.

This year the program consisted of 8 football teams and 4 cheer teams, with approximately 320 children ages ranging from 5 to 14 years old. We are proud to announce that of our 8 football teams, 5 teams continued past the regular season to compete in the playoffs with 2 teams making it to the TCFC Championship. These games were held in November.

We would like to congratulate our cheerleaders who competed in the TCFC Cheer Competition in October. Two teams placed first in their divisions and another placed 2nd in theirs. We are extremely proud of all the children who participated this year. The league would not function without the help of the volunteers from the community with years of experience who have all these things in common; their commitment to our youth, their love of youth sports and their love for the Fort! They spend countless hours doing various tasks to ensure this league is a success. We look forward to next season!

Holiday Safety Tips

Everything you need to know to keep your kids safe during the holidays.

It's that time of year again when we enjoy festive meals with family and friends, deck our halls with colorful decorations and listen to squeals of delight as our children open their brightly-wrapped presents. To help ensure your kids have fun and stay safe this holiday, here are a few tips to remember.

Decorate Your Tree With Your Kids in Mind

 Kids are curious and will want to play with the ornaments on the tree, so you might as well prepare. Move the ornaments that are



breakable or have metal hooks towards the top of the tree. That makes room at the bottom for the ones that are safer for young kids.

Water the Tree Regularly

 Natural trees look beautiful and smell great, but if they're not watered regularly, needles can dry out and pose a potential fire hazard. Make sure your tree has plenty of water by checking it regularly.

Check the Lights

 Lights are one of the best parts of holiday decorating. Take a look at the ones on your tree and in and around your home for exposed or frayed wires, loose connections or broken sockets.

In 2012, 3,270 children 19 and under were seen in emergency rooms for injuries caused by nonelectric holiday decorations, like broken ornaments. In 2012, an estimated 192,000 children were treated in an emergency room for a toy-related injury.



Blow Out Candles and Store Matches Out of Reach

- Keep holiday candles at least 12 inches away from anything that can burn, and don't forget to blow them out when you leave the room or before you go to sleep.
- Make a habit of placing matches and lighters in a safe place, out of children's reach. Avoid novelty lighters or lighters that look like toys.

Keep Harmful Plants Out of Reach

- Plants can spruce up your holiday decorating, but keep those that may be poisonous out of reach of children or pets. This includes mistletoe berries, holly berry, and Jerusalem cherry.
- In a poison emergency, call the national Poison Control Center at 1-800-222-1222.

Find the Perfect Toy for the Right Age

 Consider your child's age when purchasing a toy or game this holiday season. It's worth a second to read the instructions and warning labels to make sure the gift is just right.



 Before you've settled on the perfect toy, check to make sure there aren't any small parts or other potential choking hazards.

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Keep Button Batteries Away from Young Kids

 Keep a special eye on small pieces, including button batteries that may be included in electronic toys. While these kinds of games are great for older kids, they can pose a potential danger for younger, curious siblings.

Prevent Spills with Pot Handles

 Kids love to reach, so to prevent burns from hot holiday food or liquid spills, simply use the back burner of your stove and turn pot handles away from the edge.

Engage Older Kids in Cooking

 Teach older responsible kids how to cook safely. Teach them never to leave the kitchen while they're using the stove or oven. Instruct older kids to use oven mitts or potholders to remove items from the oven or stove and teach them how to use a microwave safely.

Check Your Car Seat Before Holiday Travel

 Seventy-three percent of car seats are not used or installed correctly, so before you hit the road, check your car seat. Here's a quick <u>car seat checklist</u> to help you out. It takes only 15 minutes. If you are having even the slightest trouble, questions or concerns, certified child passenger safety technicians are able to help or even double check your work. <u>Find a Safe Kids car seat checkup event</u> <u>near you</u>.

Use Booster Seats

 Safety in the car goes beyond your little ones.
Kids who have outgrown a forward-facing harness seat are not ready for a seat belt or front seat yet. They are safest in a booster seat that



enables the adult seat belt to fit properly. Even when children have graduated from booster seats, they should remain in the back seat until they reach the age of 13.

Have an Exit Strategy on the Road

 So now the car is packed, the kids are in the right seat, the seats are installed properly, and you're on the open road. Nothing can stop you now, right? Wrong. That's when you hear that all too familiar howl that means "I want food" or "Change my diaper." When it happens, please don't worry about making good time. Instead, get off at the next exit and find a safe area to feed or change your child.
