A Message From The Director:

This month, I'm excited to invite you to two events that you won't want to miss. The first is the Silence is Death Community Engagement Meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 7, at 5:30 PM at Indian River State College. We will join the Health Department in bringing together community residents, leaders and advocates to acknowledge the progress we've made in the fight against HIV/AIDS in St. Lucie County, and to mobilize for the work ahead. When I left this community in the 90s, we were #1 in the state for HIV cases for Black women. I myself knew and loved three Black women from this community who died from that disease. Twenty years later, due to the hard work and effort of so many, we are lower than the state rate. We can achieve those same outcomes for today's challenges if we are willing to do the work together.

The second event is our Mini-Masters Youth Development Symposium, where we will celebrate 10 Years of Kids at Hope in St. Lucie County. We are bringing speakers from across the nation to share best practices on addressing disparities in juvenile justice, education and public health, and dealing with the trauma that permeates so many of our children's lives. The keynote speaker is Antwone Fisher, whose life is chronicled in the 2002 movie of a foster child who triumphed despite horrific adversity. We are asking Roundtable members and staff, community partners, youth service providers, educators, police officers, juvenile probation officers, case workers, guardians ad litem, attorneys, judges, parents, and anyone who wants to be part of the solution to attend this symposium. On the third day, we will have a birthday party with Rick Miller to celebrate 10 Years of Kids at Hope in St. Lucie County. EVERYONE is invited!

CADCA National Leadership Forum

February 6-10, 2017, Kim Thomas-Pate (Substance Abuse Coordinator) and Shaniek Maynard (Roundtable Executive Director) will travel to the Washington D.C. area to join 3,000 substance abuse prevention specialists and advocates from throughout the country for CADCA's (Community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America) 27th Annual National Leadership Forum. The forum will cover a wide range of topics – from preventing prescription drug abuse and the abuse of synthetic drugs and marijuana, to creating tobacco-free environments, and developing policies to reduce underage drinking. This is the nation's largest training event for community prevention leaders, treatment professionals and researchers.

Congratulations to Kim Thomas-Pate, who will receive an award on behalf of Drug Free St. Lucie for attending and graduating from CADCA's three week Coalition Academy. The Academy teaches coalitions how to create effective logic models and implement strategies for change.

RESTORING THE YILLAGE YOUTH INITIATIVE

AGGRESSION REPLACEMENT TRAINING GRADUATION (ART)

Some of the shootings and violence in Fort Pierce can be traced back to relatively mundane arguments between youth from different areas in the city. A perceived insult may be followed by some type of retaliation that in turn escalates the violence. Distrust and lack of opportunities to safely interact with each other perpetuate the cycle of violence.

Over the last three months the *Restoring the Village Youth Initiative* has explored these dynamics in greater detail with gang-involved youth through Aggression Replacement Training. The training, which is implemented in collaboration with Sequel Care of Florida and the Department of Juvenile Justice (and with financial support by the Children's Services Council and the City of Fort Pierce), engaged seven young men in intense discussions around aggressive behaviors and the "code of the streets." The goal was to engage them in conversations about violence, teach them positive alternatives to aggression and anti-social behaviors, and help them develop a concern for the need and rights of others.

The atmosphere in the workshops was informal and relaxed, and thanks to an amazing and very culturally competent facilitator, the young men have been able to improve trust and relationships with each other. On January 19th, the group graduated. Feedback from the youth has been overwhelmingly positive. Indeed, all expressed interest in continuing to meet and engage with each other. One participant said the workshops had humbled him, making him want to work harder to change. Others said it has helped them avoid confrontations at home and in school.

Although the effects of social interventions like this are not usually immediate nor appear in a linear fashion, Outreach Workers confirm that many of the clients are making greater efforts to talk through issues with family members they would normally argue with, and stop and think before they act, which is also reflected in a decrease in behavioral referrals in school.

Another ART workshop series will be offered to 12 new RTVYI clients starting in March 2017.

On January 3rd, 30 youth activists attended a Fort Pierce City Commission meeting. Three students gave brief statements to the Mayor, Commissioners, and City Manager during public comment to introduce Youth Leadership.

At the January 17th meeting, Fort Pierce Communications Manager Shyanne Helms and Marketing Specialist Joe Sweat taught the students how to launch a social media campaign, since many of their projects to reduce bullying, substance abuse and violence will involve social media. After the presentation, the students split into their Fort Pierce and Port St. Lucie Youth Councils. The Fort Pierce Youth Council was facilitated by Ms. Helms and Mr. Sweat. We are pleased to announce that we are working with Port St. Lucie Councilwoman Stephanie Morgan to design the Port St. Lucie Youth Council.

The next meeting is Tuesday, February 7 at 6:30pm at the River Walk Center in Fort Pierce. Also, registration is now open for the three day National Youth Leadership Institute Training, which will take place over Presidents' Day weekend at Children's Services Council. 


